

Dear Ladies and Gentlemen,

Germany is looking to accelerate the restoration of its carbon-rich habitats, both on land and at sea. In line with the UN decade on ecosystem restoration (2021-2030) and the Global Biodiversity Frameworks goal to restore at least 30% of degraded habitats by 2030 a dedicated national fund with a volume of \in 4 billion is about to be established in Germany. This "Aktionsprogramm Natürlicher Klimaschutz" (Federal Action Plan on Nature Based Solutions for Climate and Biodiversity) is in the marine environment focusing on the maintenance and restoration of saltmarshes, sea grass meadows, kelp forests and sediments. These "blue carbon" habitats can not only sequester carbon, but also benefit nature conservation and coastal protection.

At this workshop we will showcase best practice examples from the Wadden Sea and beyond in order to inspire national restoration efforts in habitats along the German North Sea coast. What are the lessons learnt from past restoration efforts? How can blue carbon restoration not only benefit the climate, but also local people and nature? These and many more questions will be discussed with policy makers and stakeholders from national authorities, academia, non-governmental and other interested organizations.

Furthermore, we would like to strengthen the network of practitioners, experts and other "nature-based solutions" stakeholders along and beyond the trilateral Wadden Sea.
